YES on Prop 57

YES on Prop 57

A **YES** vote on Prop 57 means that youth must have a hearing in a juvenile court before they could be transferred to adult court. Further, certain state prison inmates convicted of nonviolent felony offenses would be considered for earlier release. Additional sentencing credits could be awarded for good behavior and approved rehabilitative or educational achievements.

YES on Prop 62

A **YES** on Prop 62 repeals the death penalty and replaces it with life imprisonment without possibility of parole. It would apply retroactively to existing death sentences, and increases the portion of life inmates' wages that may be applied to victim restitution. No future offenders could be sentenced to death by the state.

on Prop 66

A **NO** on Prop 66 means changing the procedures governing state court challenges to death sentences, like limiting the number of successive petitions and imposing time limits on those challenges. Its language is confusing, and it creates even more layers of bureaucracy. This is not the real reform our criminal justice system needs.
